Sr. Frances Betz - Missionary/Educator...


Sharing, caring and finding successes with St. Augustine students

The alarm clock goes off at 4:30 a.m. each morning for Sr. Frances Betz, a member of the Benedictine Sisters Order of Norfolk, NE. She starts each morning with a meditation, then at 6:00 a.m., Lauds with her Community, Mass at 6:30 a.m., followed by breakfast. Sister Frances makes

the short two-minute commute from the convent, on the grounds of St. Augustine's, over to the school library at 7:30 a.m. and begins to get ready for the students to arrive for the school day.

Sr. Frances meets each of the eight grades weekly but she is available to help students all day. Her passion for teaching shows as she interacts with the different grade levels and individually with the students. She reads to the students, conducts book discussions and facilitates book quizzes. "She has high hopes for all the students and it is easy to see the joy flowing out of her when she sees a child finding success, especially in reading," shared Don Blackbird, principal of St. Augustine's. When asked what, she likes most about serving at St. Augustine's and working with the students Sr. Frances stated, "I love to show the children the progress they are making in reading, displaying the good results, and seeing the children walk away proudly with quiz results in hand."

Sr. Frances first served St. Augustine's from 1978 to 1982. After assignments in Appalachia and South Africa she returned in 2001 and has been at the Mission ever since. "She brings with her years of real life experience as a missionary and is such a valuable living resource for the students," said Don Blackbird. "She gladly shares her stories of service in Africa, her childhood during World War II in Germany and her vocation story of how she resisted her family's objections and left home to become a Benedictine sister as a young woman." 


From the Principal


The students are getting back to work after a wonderful Christmas break. It is always hard to come back to the day-to-day school routine, but the students seem energetic about getting back to learning; and the teachers are eager to continue to challenge the students with new classwork. The administration has been busy these last few months trying to make improvements by creating an environment conducive to learning while trying to hold down costs, especially energy costs.

This past year we conducted an extensive energy audit and have begun the process of making changes where we can conserve energy and reduce costs. We have been changing out light fixtures in the classrooms and hallways, while also reducing energy consuming electronics that are outdated and not efficient.

This winter we have seen some challenges. Even though this winter has been mild by Nebraska standards, it has also held its fair share of extremely cold days. We continue to struggle to find ways to save energy costs, which tend to skyrocket in the winter months. We have begun planning to replace our heating and cooling system, which is no longer able to keep up with the cold of a Nebraska winter or the heat of a Nebraska summer. Our current system is




outdated and is a system of patched equipment and three separate heating and cooling systems being run by a computer that is over sixteen years old. The new system is going to cost \$100,000, but will ultimately be much more

Sponsor A Child Program...

St. Augustine Indian Mission strives to give our children the best education possible. St. Augustine Indian Mission relies on the generosity of our benefactors to help defray these costs through our "Sponsor a Child" program. Through this program, prospective donors can sponsor one or more children with a gift of \$5,000 each for a full year, and \$2,500 for six months. Donors are then assigned to a specific student whose progress throughout the year can be measured. Students are asked to write to their sponsor regularly and donor and child are formally introduced at a



recognition luncheon held each spring. It is a moving experience when child and donor meet and a fulfilling experience for those who generously give to the program.

The "Sponsor a Child" program helps cover the costs of educating the children at St. Augustine Indian Mission. Each family at St. Augustine's is asked to pay \$500 toward their student's tuition. This only covers a small amount of the costs to educate each student. The "Sponsor a Child" program is a wonderful way to help the Mission, and allows the donor, the opportunity to get to know the children of St. Augustine's.
